The approach of this study is quantitative, with the data collection technique through questionnaires through google form. In this study, data was collected from the teachers who are taking entrepreneurship mindset classes for the students of classes 9 to 12 in Delhi government schools. All the teachers who are teaching Entrepreneurship Mindset Curriculum classes are population of this study. Random Stratified sampling has used to get sample of study. Total 216 teachers from different districts of Delhi participated in this study.

### **III. ANALYSIS AND RESULT**

The following are the analysis of the data through which, get to understand different perceptions of the teachers about the implementation of Entrepreneurship mindset curriculum in their classes and ultimately in their schools.

1) Entrepreneurship Mindset classes will be helpful in the life of the students

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Analysis : It is very clear by the analysis of the above graph that majority of the teachers agreed that Entrepreneurship Mindset Curriculum will be helpful in their life, also 21% teachers strongly agreed with the same statement. This means teachers have clearly agreed that Entrepreneurship Mindset Curriculum is good initiative for students. While small percentage of teachers disagree that Entrepreneurship Mindset Curriculum is useful for teachers.

2) EM Classes will be useful even for students who want to become teacher or doctor.

Analysis : 62% teachers agreed that Entrepreneurship Mindset Curriculum not only to create job providers, but also it will be useful for those students who want to choose job as another career profession like Teachers, doctors. Approximately 18 % teachers strongly agreed with the above statement. However, some percentage disagreed with the above statement and approximately 13% have not any views on this.

3) Using Activities and stories is the right method to develop Entrepreneurial Mindset among students.



Analysis : Approximately 66% teachers agreed that activities which give experiential learning and stories (of real entrepreneurs) which inspires students is the correct method to develop entrepreneurial mindset amongst students. Approximately 20% teachers strongly agreed that activities and stories helps students to develop entrepreneurial mindset. However, some percentage disagreed on the above statement.

4) Entrepreneurship Mindset can be useful while teaching other subjects

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Analysis : Majority of the teachers i.e. 61% supports that Entrepreneurship Mindset can be useful while teaching other subjects. There in one important analysis that 18% teachers was neutral means they did not have their any views. Though teachers who disagreed and strongly disagreed also less in percentage.

5) It takes very less time for me to make lesson plan for EM class.

Analysis : In the response of above statement only 53% teachers agreed that lesson plan for Entrepreneurship Mindset class takes less time. Analysis :- Majority of teachers (76%) agreed anonymously that students should speak more in the entrepreneurship mindset classroom. Approximately 23% teachers believes that both students and teachers should speak equally.
