Socio-ecological Issues in Barbara Kingsolver's Unsheltered

Barbara Kingsolver's *Unsheltered* is the story of Willa, a middle aged woman who, in a attempt to get funding to fix up her shoddy old home. She realizes the history of her town - especially about Thatcher Greenwood. The story moves back and forth between Willa and Thatcher, depicting similarities of two places in their respective times. Kingsolver's hope in *Unsheltered* was to explore "paradigm shift".

Kingsolver's *Unsheltered* is the narrative of two families of two different centuries. The settings are different corners of Sixth and Plum. These families face the challenges of surviving as they confront the cultural shifts. Willa and Thatcher realize that the future is uncertain but shelter can be set up with the union of family members and in the strength of the human spirit.

In the year, 1870, Thatcher, the science teacher fights back with fulfilling the whims of his determined wife. Hence he develops a connection with his next-door neighbor, naturalist Mary Treat. Willa tries to enfold four generations that are living in a house but falling down. They members are struggling with day-today conflicts. In the old setting, Thatcher is facing the issues with other characters. Kingsolver uncovers similarities depicting the disturbances and depressions of members.

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The main story moves around Willa and Iano. Both find themselves middle-aged and jobless. As Willa learns about Thatcher Greenwood, a science teacher whose enthusiasm for Charles Darwin's controversial new theory of evolution endangers his livelihood and reputation.

Willa Knox with her companion followed all the norms as sensible parents and experts in professions. They have only debts and a hereditary house that is also falling apart. Thatcher discovers himself under siege. His employer prohibits him to tell of the thrilling efforts published by Charles Darwin. Kingsolver celebrates life's adaptability and resilience, which includes humankind's capacity for learning, courage, change, and progress.

Barbara Kingsolver's *Unsheltered* is not typical of climate fiction since the environmental concerns are more related to eco-socio issues, exploitation and environmental justice.
